SECURITY ASSISTANCE MONITOR U.S. Defense Bill Breakdown A Basic Guide: **Major Changes to Security Cooperation** On November 30, a House and Senate Conference Committee released the details of a compromise bill to authorize Defense Department programs and policies for FY 2017. This year's bill includes major reforms to security cooperation, including the creation of a new multi-purpose "train and equip" authority that removes several restrictions on security aid and requires human rights and institution building aid. The compromise also improves oversight and analysis of security cooperation and significantly increases security aid to Afghanistan and Ukraine. The following table shows some of the key differences among the compromise and earlier House and Senate passed versions on security cooperation reform and global and regional authorities.
